Do you have any other photos? The streaks on the breast aren't extensive enough to sell me on it being a Savannah. I don't think this a Savannah Sparrow but most likely a Lincoln's Sparrow.

As for Belding's, the breast streaking that is there isn't dark enough to be a Belding's subspecies. Belding's are the only one that breed at Bolsa Chica but at this time of year the other subspecies are starting to migrate in for the winter.

I was thinking possibly Lincoln's due to what appeared to be a wide supercillium but the yellowish wash isn't there on the chest.
