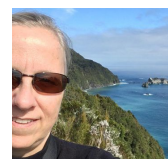
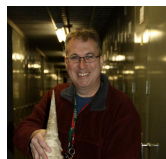
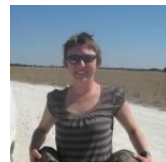

Impacts and Consequences of a Virtual Meeting

SPNHC-ICOM NATHIST Conference

- Engage much larger audience
 - Typical SPNHC meeting 400-500 - registration for SPNHC/ICOM NatHist 1900
 - Plenary had over 500 people attend
- Engage much broader/diverse audience
 - SPNHC & ICOM NATHIST members - representation from 67 countries and 711 institutions
- More diverse ways to engage
 - Chat, Q&A - ability to answer more questions and facilitate audience participation
- More post-meeting ways to engage through recording
 - Engage those who could not watch live - time zones
 - Live to YouTube integration - ~200 people watched plenary
 - Recordings posted on YouTube - viewed over 4000 times
 - **Content lives on**

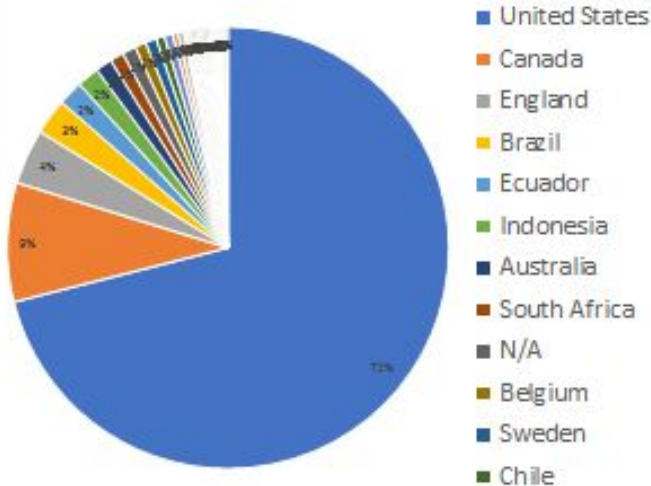
Not as engaging as in-person meeting and limited social interaction (no banquet, coffee breaks, chats, etc.).

Recruiting

- Surveys sent out in early April to gauge interest in online conference
 - For Presenters - contacted those who previously submitted abstracts
 - For Moderators - contacted symposium organizers to run symposia and member volunteers to run general sessions

Training

- Three Zoom training sessions (as well as several ad hoc sessions)
 - Discussed roles
 - Screen sharing
- Modification of Digital Data's roles document

- Playing recorded presentation document

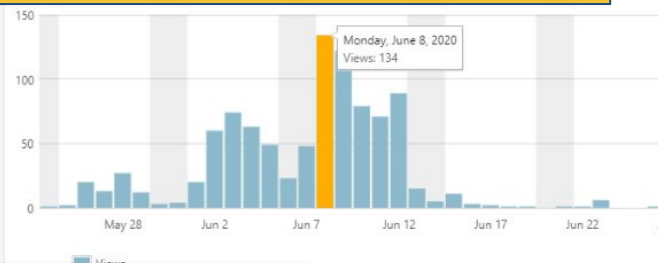

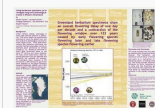

SPNHC-ICOM NATHIST Conference

- Traditionally SPNHC reaches out to sponsors for in-person meetings at various levels (Diamond, Platinum, Gold, Silver, Bronze) - \$15,000 to \$1,500. Typically provides trade show booth, logo on all printed materials and general slides, paid registrations, etc.
- Opportunity to partially emulate vendor fair held at SPNHC meetings and provide exposure for vendors, sponsors
- List of vendors from past meetings
- Sent email offering three opportunities
 - Logo on splash screen
 - Logo and link on website and in program
 - 15 minute Q&A session between oral sessions
- Also asked for donations
 - Most donated between \$500-1000
- Sessions posted on YouTube for further exposure
- Email thanking them for their participation and any donation
